Gravel Road Maintenance Discussion

- Jim, Chan, and Jerry checked out Butterfly Road last Tuesday. Routine maintenance is needed, but there are no major problems. There is a large tree leaning away from the road. If it falls, root ball damage could extend into the road. Cost to drop the tree and leave it in the woods is \$175. We will do it.
- According to Jerry, the last major maintenance was done 3 years ago. All of our gravel roads need re-grading, ditch work, and gravel replacement at a cost of about \$6000.
- There is a state code for construction of their roads that includes specs for paving, chip and tar, and gravel. It would be good to use those codes for our roads.
- If well maintained, costs of gravel and paved roads are a trade-off. The code requires 6 inches of gravel under chip and tar. Chip and tar requires a re-coat about every 5 to 6 years.
- The section of Butterfly Lane that requires improvement is about ¼ mile long. Our estimates for chip and tar are out of date.

1:45 pm - John Sheley arrives for his presentation on paving Butterfly Lane

- Observations
 - Road is lower on downhill side in spots. It should be re-crowned
 - Ditches should be improved.
 - Some drains may not be working
 - Paving is desired. Gravel and chip and tar are a waste.
- Proposed solution
 - He has several estimates for correcting the crown, filling in two dips, adding a gravel base, and paving.
 - The road will be 12 feet wide.
 - It will tie in to existing pavement.
 - The cost is about \$30,000 with some uncertainty due to the variation in the actual amount of gravel required (150 to 230 tons) for the base.
 - The new road should require no maintenance for 5 years and only minor maintenance for another 5 years.
- Questions / observations from the board
 - After the work is complete, the association will pay for on-going maintenance costs provided the work is done according to state codes.
 - In case of damage by heavy trucks, it must be repaired or paid for by those who do the damage.
 - Should we have an engineer monitor the project to make sure specs are met?

2:30 pm – John leaves and discussion continues

• The association can't afford to contribute half of \$30,000, but it is to our advantage to have the

- work done since maintenance costs will be reduced.
- Five home owners are involved. We could pay one share so that the cost is divided six ways.
- But, there is no money for the purpose in this years budget. We can't spend money needed for other maintenance.
- In the past, money has been moved from one line item over to another to handle unexpected expenses. Money has never been moved to a whole new line item.
- Proposal We will add a \$5000 line item for this purpose in next years budget and give the home owners their choice of one the following three options.
 - 1. They can pay the full cost of the work this year with the association contribution coming back to them next year.
 - 2. They can defer paving until next year.
 - 3. The association will pay for normal gravel road maintenance this year and paving will be postponed indefinitely.
- Joyce will write a letter describing the offer.

Other Issues

- The Forest Park Court wall
 - The wall belongs to Erin Drummond since it is totally on her property. Our responsibility is for the road, not the wall.
 - She has talked to Dave Neuman about it, so we need a different lawyer.
 - We will consult a different lawyer and have him send a letter to Erin Drummond disavowing our responsibility.
- Some other home owners associations may have lower insurance costs. We will evaluate coverage and get new estimates.
- There have been two complaints about dogs since the last board board meeting. Both have been resolved by telephone or email.
